

INSTRUCTIONS TO AUTHORS

for preparation of articles for EURODIJALOG, Journal for European Issues

1. The text should be no longer than 15 pages (maximum 6000 words). The text is submitted in electronic form.
2. The text should be typed in MS WORD or other compatible word processor, without additional formatting. The tables and graphs should be prepared in the simplest possible form, without additional formatting.
3. Elements of the text/essay:
 - name of the author and title
 - title of the essay and subtitles (if any)
 - short description about the author (1-3 sentences)
 - abstract in Macedonian (1/2 page)
 - abstract in English (1/2 page)
 - reference, cited literature
4. The references should be unified, based on the MLA style. Examples:

 - v) for used Web pages:

 - g) for newspapers and magazines:
